POW/MIA News

Profile in Courage: POW who blinked "Torture" dies

About a month after his deployment to Vietnam on the USS Independence, Navy Commander Jeremiah Denton's A-6 was shot down south of Hanoi on July 18, 1965. He was captured, subjected to four years in solitary confinement, two years in a cell the size of a refrigerator, endured starvation, delirium and torture sessions that sometimes lasted days.



His communist captors attempted to exploit him for propaganda. Ten months into his imprisonment Denton was tortured to submit to a filmed interview with a Japanese reporter. He walks into the room, bows and sits on a chair Jay C. Hess before the camera. Hunched over, he clasps his hands between his knees. As he speaks, he blinks with his eyes spelling in Morse code t-o-r-t-u-r-e. (T -. O - - - , R . - ., U . . -,E .)

The reporter asked Denton what he thought about the 'so-called Vietnamese War." His captors assumed he was broken and expected him to denounce the U.S. war policy.

Courageously he said, "Well, I don't know what is happening but whatever the position of my government is, I support it fully. And whatever the position of my government is, I believe in it – yes sir. I am a member of that government, and it is my job to support it, and I will as long as I live." Severe punishment and solitary confinement followed.

Denton was among the highest-ranking officers taken prisoner in Vietnam and the spokesman for the first group of prisoners released in February 1973 at Clark AB in the Philippines. Stepping from the C-141 aircraft with tearful eyes he said, "We are honored to have had the opportunity to serve our country under difficult circumstances. We are profoundly grateful to our Commander in Chief and to our nation for this day. God Bless America."

Rear Admiral Jeremiah Denton, father of seven, first Republican elected Senator in his native Alabama since Reconstruction died March 28, 2014 of complications from a heart ailment at a hospice in Virginia Beach, Virginia. He was 89.

FROM THE DEPARTMENT THE AMERICAN LEGION and NATIONAL LEGISLATION

If you ever doubted the influence of the American Legion at the national level, don't worry. Our membership and the first class way The Legion does its business in Washington, D.C is there. On March 26 at a joint session of the Veterans Affairs Committees, United States Congress, I sat in a room with 500+ Legionnaires ("Legion hats"), plus Auxiliary and Sons of the American Legion to listen to our National Commander Daniel Dellinger testify on the American Legion's legislative priorities for the 113th Congress, 2nd Session. The committees were overwhelmed at the number of citizens that are there for our Veterans. You can read the executive version of those thirteen priorities on Post 27's website (www.post27.org), as well as the 15-page version.

There is another piece of legislation at the National level that has my interest, is closer to home for many of us, and is co-sponsored by our own Congressman Jim Matheson. The latest title is "Honor America's Guard-Reserve Retirees Act", H.R. 679/S.629. For many in the Guard and Reserve who retire with 20+ years or retire with less than 20 years for medical/other reasons, if they never served 180 days of consecutive active duty other than for training, they are NOT considered "veterans", even though they carry a military retiree card just like the 20-year active duty veteran, receives TRICARE for Life, can shop at the commissary, PX/BX, etc. They have always been told they are not veterans under the official VA definition. In most cases, if they served during the war periods as stated on the Legion application, and at least one day during the period on Title 10 orders, they qualify to be in the American Legion. In my mind, they are fellow veterans. Not that this group would be eligible for specific VA benefits, but the right to be called a veteran is important. This is why I always ask if they have ever served in the military instead of asking if they are a veteran. Different groups give different answers.

Please let Congressman Matheson know if you support this change in terminology. Send him a letter, email, or call. We owe this to our brothers and sisters in arms, even if they did not go into a combat zone.
