2nd Vice Commander

This has been a whale of a ride as 2nd Vice Commander. I have learned a lot about the members of the Post and what it is like to get a team of volunteers actively engaged. I have truly enjoyed this past year working on the Oratorical and the Boys State Scholarship programs. We truly have a great generation of young men and women who are preparing themselves to be our future leaders.

Several years ago, when I transferred my Legion membership from the Layton Post, I was greatly surprised at the quality of men and women who are members. On the day I transferred to the post, I had lunch with John Sheets. I was asking him a lot of questions about the Post and the environment I was about to be a member of. John made me aware that the Post was just beginning to get reactivated. We then had a discussion about how to get the present members active and how to get

veterans to want to join. Having served in the Riverton Post for several years, I was aware of the importance of the Military Funeral Honors program. It was the life blood to that post. John indicated that the Post had rifles at one time, but transferred them to another post that needed them. I told John that if we could get the rifles, that I would work with the MFH team to train them. I agreed to transfer my membership to Post 27 and with John, take on that challenge.

It has been an exciting ride since then to get our team trained and committed to the role of the MFH's Team. It is a challenge to get dedicated members to volunteer to assist with this program. Presently, we have a volunteer list of about 17 members who are on our volunteer list. Some are consistently there to assist on a continual basis, and some volunteer as their work, family commitments and such allow. Several of our team members are beginning to feel a bit over-tasked with this "part time" commitment.

This is a commitment. We cannot control when our veterans decide to go meet their maker. It could be one a week, or two or three and sometimes four a week. The important thing is that we have volunteers that are committed as much as possible that when the call comes, it is important to have committed members that step forward and volunteer to fill the assignments. Our goal is to have five rifles, a commander, bugler, and presenter of the casings at every funeral; a total of eight (8). Ideally, seven rifles, commander, bugler, and presenter would be great; a total of ten (10). So, you can see, we need a greater commitment from our membership to step forward.



On the positive side, since our first participation in the MFH's program, we have come a long way in supporting our deceased veterans. Several of you can still remember when it was so cold out that only one round fired in three volleys with three rifles, or the wind was so strong that two of our members were blown into two headstones and ended up on the ground. Or the time our bugle batteries gave out on the second note of taps. Or we forgot our bugle altogether, and all the

family heard was me saying "oh crap". Presently, our MFH's Team is recognized as one of the best in the state. Coming with that distinction is a larger requirement to support more funerals. This takes more commitment by more volunteers. The bottom line is that we need more members to step forward and to get involved.

Recently, I have been elected to become the Squadron Commander of the Sons of the American Legion. At this point, I am excited to take this assignment. I know that it comes with a different kind of commitment. For the program to be successful, we need the adult members of the SAL to commit to activity and to help the young men in the SAL get active and excited about the program. We have a challenge with the active membership program, but we also have some great programs that are already in force to excite the membership. As we organize the leadership and execute our annual calendar time should help us to successful. I know that our Commander wants the SAL to be ready to assist the Post with the 2019 Centennial activities. It is my goal to get there.

UTAH DRIVER LICENSE



Veterans can now have "VETERAN" printed on their state issued driver licenses or state ID cards. In order to have this accomplished, go to any state Driver License or ID Office and indicate on the application for these cards that you served in the military. You must have served on active duty and have an Honorable or General Discharge. Veterans must provide a DD-214 or a Report of Separation to have their status verified. All renewal fees are still applicable. (Utah Code 53-3-804)

HONORARY HIGH SCHOOL DIPLOMAS

Veterans from WWII, Korea, and Vietnam who left high school for military service during those conflicts may be eligible to receive Honorary High School Diplomas from the particular school that they left. Contact the local school district for information on how to receive the diploma. (Utah Code 53A-3-426). Let the Post Commander know so we can assist if needed, and honor your service and "graduation".

POW/MIA News

Recently, members of Post 27 performed a flag ceremony honoring two veterans, one of whom was Post 27 member John Sheets. After the ceremony I was approached by John's neighbor, Carolyn Smith, who said to me, "My father was a POW." I asked, "What was your father's name." "Ray Church", she replied. Although I didn't know Ray, I had met him and was impressed by his remarkable and distinguished manner and stature. He was someone you would like to know

more about. John reports that he gave a very interesting presentation to the Post when he was Commander.

Ray Church of Delta joined the Marines before World War II and was one of eight guards at the Governor's Palace in Guam's capital, Agana. Japanese began bombing and strafing Guam on December

8, 1941. At 3:00 am on Dec. 10, Japanese attacked the island

with a large force of thousands. After a short but brave resistance, Governor McMillin surrendered the island on December10. Private First Class Church was taken prisoner with the rest of the garrison on Guam. During the next four weeks of starvation he lost 40 pounds. In the bottom of an at-first stifling hot and later frigid-cold ship, he was moved to Japan for slave labor. Only four out of 10 survived. After 45 months of starvation, disease and brutal imprisonment, the Japanese guards failed to show up and the war was over.

After recovering in San Diego, Ray married, spent 40 years in banking and community service in California then moved to Ogden in 1991 where he continued community

and church service. He died Jan 16. 2013. Ray's Guam story can be found at


