### **DECEMBER HOLIDAY CELEBRATIONS**

In addition to **Christmas, December 25**, which celebrates the birth of Jesus Christ, there are other holidays celebrated in December.



Hanukkah, meaning "to dedicate", also known as the Festival of Lights, is a Jewish festival commemorating the recovery of Jerusalem and subsequent rededication of the Temple in 160 BC. Hanukkah is observed for eight nights



and days, starting on the 25th day of Kislev according to the Hebrew calendar, which may occur at any time from late November to late December in the Gregorian calendar. In 2022, the dates are **December 18~26**. The festival is observed by lighting the candles of a menorah. Each night, one additional candle is lit until all eight candles are lit together on the final night of the festival.

When, on the twenty-fifth of Kislev, the Jews had emerged victorious over their foes and destroyed them, they reentered the Temple where they found only one jar of pure oil, enough to be lit for only a single day; yet they used it for lighting the required set of lamps for eight days, until they managed to press olives and produce pure oil. Because of this, the sages of that generation ruled that the eight days beginning with the twenty-fifth of Kislev should be observed as days of rejoicing and praising the Lord. Lamps are lit in the evening over the doors of the homes, on each of the eight nights, so as to display the miracle.

Kwanzaa is an annual celebration of African-American culture from December 26 to January 1. American Maulana Karenga created Kwanzaa in 1966 during the aftermath of the Watts riots as a specifically African-American holiday, based on African harvest festival traditions from various parts of West and Southeast Africa. Karenga said his goal was to "give blacks an alternative to the existing holiday of Christmas and give blacks an opportunity to celebrate themselves and their history".

According to Karenga, the name Kwanzaa means "first fruits". First fruits festivals exist in Southern Africa celebrated in December/January with the southern solstice, It was decided to spell the holiday's name with an additional "a" so that it would have a symbolic seven letters.

Kwanzaa celebrates what its founder called the seven principles of Kwanzaa, the seven principles of African Heritage. These seven principles together comprise the "common" philosophy, a blending of nationalist, pan-Africanist, and socialist values. Each of the seven days of Kwanzaa is dedicated to one of the principles:

1)Unity, 2)Self-determination, 3)Collective work and responsibility, 3)Cooperative economics, 5)Purpose, 6)Creativity and 7)Faith. Bill Clinton gave the first presidential declaration marking the holiday. Subsequent presidents George W. Bush, Barack Obama, and Donald Trump also issued greetings to celebrate Kwanzaa.

Whichever holiday you are celebrating, may God grant all a safe and enjoyable holiday season.

### A PERSONAL CHRISTMAS MEMORY

No one likes to be away from home during the holidays and I was certainly no different. And as the 1968 Christmas season rolled around in DaNang, South Vietnam, I was feeling pretty sorry for myself. Still, to keep my mind on other things, I spent my off-hours teaching classes at the Phan Chu Trinh Public Secondary School.

There were some wonderful times at the school, too. After class one night, a bunch of us (a

couple of GI teachers and a group of Vietnamese students) were sitting around and we started singing, just for

the fun of it. Now, these young Vietnamese girls had a beautiful harmony and we GIs just stopped and listened to them.

It occurred to me that I should form them into a group and under the auspices of the Vietnamese-American Association (VAA), I did just that. They named themselves the East-West Ca Nhac Kich (meaning Players and Singers of Music). Rehearsing several nights a week, we put together a nice program of Vietnamese and American music, including an ample sampling of Christmas music. We played the Navy hospital ship USS Sanctuary, the China Beach USO and the NSA Station Hospital.



Some of our performances were for the guys who couldn't get in to see the Bob Hope Show that was in DaNang on Christmas Day. The Station Hospital performance was very sobering. This hospital was one of the places where broken men were brought directly from the fields of combat. I was surprised that the staff let us visit but they assured us that we might cheer the patients up. We would sing two or three songs in one ward and then move on to another.

During one of our Christmas carols in the burn ward, one soldier died screaming in pain. In the amputee ward, the girls had just finished singing "Silent Night" in Vietnamese and were moving on to the next ward, when a big Marine gunnery sergeant who had lost both legs and an arm reached out and grabbed one of the girls. I was immediately on alert as I wasn't certain of his intentions. But this good man, with tears rolling down his cheeks, only wanted to thank the girls "for the only Christmas I'm gonna have." At that moment, I knew that my personal, selfish homesickness didn't amount to much and that I was exactly where I needed to be.
