As soon as we start getting boys lined up I will send out a package with instructions for you to complete and return to me. As soon as possible I will notify each of you as to whether or not we have jobs available. You should also know that each counselor will be required to complete a background check prior to attending Boys State, we (Boys State) will pay for it. Your package will contain the specifics. As always, thanks for your service and support of the Legion. I look forward to working with and learning from you at another memorable Boys State.

Though by the time of this publication it will be past, but one of the military days of note I want to share happened in January 26,1970. U.S. Navy Lt. Everett Alvarez Jr. spends his 2,000th day in captivity in Southeast Asia. First taken prisoner when his [Douglas A-4

Skyhawk] was shot down on August 5, 1964, he became the longest-held POW in U.S. history. Alvarez was downed over Hon Gai during the first bombing raids against North Vietnam in retaliation for the disputed attack on U.S. destroyers in the Gulf of Tonkin in August 1964. Alvarez was released in 1973 after spending [eight years and seven months] in captivity, the first six months as the only American

prisoner in North Vietnam. From the first day of his captivity, he was shackled, isolated, nearly starved, and brutally tortured. Although he was among the more junior-rank prisoners of war, his courageous conduct under horrendous conditions and treatment helped establish the model emulated by the many other POWs that later joined him. The Filthy Thirteen

The **Filthy Thirteen** were a sub-unit within the 506th Parachute Infantry Regiment, 101st

Airborne Division, better known as the "Screaming Eagles" who descended on Hitler's Fortress Europe with the 82nd Airborne during the wee-hours of D-Day for some early-morning foreplay. The Filthies were among the hardest-hitting,

Kent Hansen harder-drinking roughnecks in the U.S. Army, and got their name for their tendency to bathe and shave only once a week during training and rarely washing their uniforms, if ever. Hello, scabies!



Their specialty was blowing up bridges and whatever else they figured could go "boom" if they strapped it to enough TNT, which caused a nightmare for the Germans as they tried in vain to fend off the Allied invasion. The jobs were as risky as they could be, but the Filthy Thirteen were able to blow the guts out of Nazi-occupied France all the way from Normandy to the Battle of the Bulge. Their fearless leader, Jake McNiece was part Native-American, and his fellow Filthies chose to honor this by going into battle sporting mohawks and war-paint.

But before he even made it that far, McNiece had to enlist and, at the age of 23, was delivered this nugget of advice from the enlisting officer: "You may just be 23. I don't know, but your face and your head looks like it's been used as practice for hand grenade tossing and wore out three bodies already."

If that's not the stuff of movies, we don't know what is. Wait, yes we do, this quote from fellow Filthy Thirteener Robert Cone regarding the D-Day mission: "We landed near a hedgerow, from which the Germans were firing at us, and the guy I was with was killed. I got hit in the right shoulder, which broke my arm all the way down into the forearm. The bullet was lodged in there for a year. I was able to get away, though, but could not hold my rifle."

<u>ions of The American Legion</u>

I am the new Commander of the Sons of the American Legion Squadron 27 and I am hoping for great things in 2020. My vision for the SAL is an organization that supports the Post when it's short-staffed for events, and offers opportunities to help people, especially young folks, grow their patriotic sentiments. The Post is involved in a lot of community service – the flag retirement, providing honor guards at funerals, placing flags on veterans' graves on Memorial Day and Veterans Day, etc. – and often needs additional help. The SAL should be there to lend a hand when necessary.

We live in a society where folks – again, mostly young – spend their time on social media, video games, and other screen time. Or they spend it in school and physical activities that do not promote patriotism as a primary goal. Although our sponsored

scout troops are growing, the number of scouts in Utah is shrinking, and with it the historical place our youth learned love of country. The SAL should be a place to help fill this void.



I believe this can be done in many creative ways but will only focus on a few in this letter. First, and most obviously, serving the community in the activities discussed above. Being in an honor guard, placing flags on graves, gives a young person patriotic vigor. Hearing the stories of veterans – Post members and others – can have a similar affect. With the number of citizens that have served in the armed forces constantly shrinking, this is one of the primary ways young folks can understand the sacrifices that have been made by those that did serve.

Learning United States history – military and non-military –

through lectures and presentations at the monthly SAL meetings is another method I hope to employ to teach

patriotism. Other topics that can be presented include geopolitics, military strategy, or why patriotism is important. These, and other activities will need to be interesting, and fun, or folks won't make time in their schedules to come. But with the success and anticipation of war films and video games, I hope this will be a successful strategy.


