

The Battle of Gettysburg

The Battle of Gettysburg was fought July 1–3, 1863, in and around the town of Gettysburg, Pennsylvania, by Union and Confederate forces during the American Civil War. In the battle, Union Major General George Meade's Army of the Potomac defeated attacks by Confederate General Robert E. Lee's Army of Northern Virginia, halting Lee's invasion of the North. The battle involved the largest number of casualties of the entire war and is often described as the war's turning point due to the Union's decisive victory and concurrence with its victorious Siege of Vicksburg

On the third day of battle, fighting continued on Culp's Hill, and cavalry battles raged to the east and south, but the main event was a dramatic infantry assault by around 12,000 Confederates against the center of the Union line on Cemetery Ridge, known as Pickett's Charge. The charge was repelled by Union rifle and artillery fire, at great loss to the Confederate army. Lee led his army on a difficult retreat back to Virginia. Between 46,000 and 51,000 soldiers from both armies were casualties in the three-day battle, the most costly in US history. On November 19, President Lincoln used the dedication

ceremony for the Gettysburg National Cemetery to honor the fallen Union soldiers and redefine the purpose of the war in his historic Gettysburg Address. It remains one of the best-known speeches in American history.

The last part of Lincoln's speech goes as follows:

...that from these honored dead we take increased devotion to that cause for which they gave the last full measure of devotion—that we here highly resolve that these dead shall not have died in vain—that this nation, under God, shall have a new birth of freedom—and that government of the people, by the people, for the people, shall not perish from the earth.

May we honor, and may God grant us never to forget, those from the Civil War and all wars who have given "the last full measure of devotion" to protect our liberty and freedom.

Celebrating 50 years of Freedom

Nearly 200 previous residents of the 'Hanoi Hilton' were guests of the Anaheim Weston Resort in California the last week of May 2023. American Airlines provided free flights to and from the event for former Vietnam POWs plus one. The Nixon Library (Yorba Linda) staff showed their

skills by filling the streets leading to the library with flag waving school children and citizens, hosting a repeat of the dinner President Nixon held in a

Jay Hess dinner President Nixon held in giant tent on the White House south lawn 50 years ago, providing remarkable tour guides for the 450 POWs plus guests and hosting great entertainment with BBQ meals for all plus two long 'In-N-Out Burg' semi-trucks The POW group had their pictures taken with both Presidents Nixon's daughter and President Reagan's granddaughter.

Thanks to the many generous sponsors the event was free to the POWs except for some meals. The



event was very capably organized by the first guest of the Hanoi Hilton, Everett Alvarez and his committee.

His A-4 was shot down August 5, 1964 over North Vietnam. He was released on February 12, 1973. He spent eight years, six months in captivity second to Army Colonel Floyd Thompson who was captive in the forests and mountains of South Vietnam, Laos and North Vietnam 10 days short of nine years.

Alvarez retired as a Navy Commander, with 20 years of service, in 1980. He later served as Deputy Director of Peace Corps, Deputy Director of Veterans Administration and founded a multimillion-dollar business, Alvarez LLC.

I was fortunate that Michelle, six of my children and their spouses and two grandchildren could join me for perhaps the Vietnam's POW's final salute.



4th of July Fun Facts

Here, you'll find a list of fun July 4th facts that you may not have known.

The Liberty Bell was tapped 13 times on July 4th until 1846.

Every year on July 4, descendants of the Declaration of Independence signers tap the Liberty Bell 13 times. The tradition was created as a way to honor the original 13 colonies. But the Liberty Bell hasn't been rung since 1846. The last time the bell rang was on Washington's birthday in February 1846, when a major crack appeared on the bell.



According to the National Hot Dog and Sausage Council, Los Angeles residents alone consume about 30 million pounds of hot dogs on July

safe to say they're a holiday favorite! The Nathan's Famous 4th of July hot dog eating contest began more than a century ago. According to the company itself, the first unofficial contest took place on July 4th, 1916. The contest, which began with four immigrants competing to determine who was the most patriotic, ended up becoming one of the most widely known July 4th traditions in America. Coney Island hosts a famous hot

dog-eating contest every year on July 4th. It takes place at Nathan's Famous Corporation's original and best-known restaurant in Coney Island, New York City. But if you can't make it in person, you can still watch the televised event from home! Joey Chestnut currently holds the title of hot dog-eating world champion after setting the new record at Nathan's. He ate a record-breaking 76 hot dogs and buns in the 2021 competition.

President Zachary Taylor died after falling ill at a July 4 celebration.

He died on July 9, 1850, after only 16 months in office. The exact cause of his death is still debated by historians but many believe it had something to do with the large quantities of cherries and iced milk he had during the 4th of July festivities.

John Adams predicted that Independence Day would be a huge celebration for many generations to come but thought we picked the wrong day.

In a letter he wrote to his wife, Abigail Adams, he declared that the day should be filled with games, sports, parades, and laughter. He basically planned the day for us! But he thought Independence Day should be celebrated on July 2. He had a point, given that the Continental Congress *did* declare its freedom from Great Britain on July 2, 1776. However, an official document explaining this move to the public wasn't published until two days later, on July 4, 1776.

Three U.S. presidents have died on the 4th of July but only one was born on that day.

James Monroe, John Adams, and Thomas Jefferson all died on the patriotic day. (Adams and Jefferson passed in 1826, and Monroe passed five years later in 1831.) America's 30th president, Calvin Coolidge, was born on July 4, 1872.

There are some copies of the Declaration of Independence with a woman's signature on it.

Mary Katharine Goddard wasn't one of the official signers in 1776, but the printer and publisher added her name to the Declaration of Independence after she was hired by Congress to print copies.

There are about 16,000 Independence Day fireworks displays that take place each year.



America's 4th of July tradition is a bit of a loud one, but iconic nonetheless. According to History.com, the custom dates back to 1777. When we look at the costs, Americans spend over \$1 billion on fireworks every 4th of July. Hospitals receive a surplus of patients on July 4th due to fireworks-related injuries. In 2020, an estimated 15,600 people were hospitalized with injuries related to fireworks. Learning proper firework handling protocol can help prevent these mishaps.

July 4th wasn't an official holiday until almost 100 years after the Declaration of Independence was signed.

It wasn't common to celebrate this patriotic event for the first few decades of America's independence. When it was established as an official holiday in 1870, it became one of the most popular nonreligious celebrations in the United States.
