POW-MIA Chairman Jay Hess: A new agreement between the U.S. and Vietnam has paved the way for the U.S. military's Joint POW/MIA Accounting Command to bring home more MIA. To date, the command has repatriated and identified 687 remains in Vietnam. A total of 1,284 Americans remain missing from that conflict. There are similar efforts in Korea, Leige, Belgium (WWII aircraft crash site), and other locations. More than 400,000 of the 16 million Americans who served in World War II died. At the end of the war, the U.S. Government was unable to recover, identify, and bury approximately 79,000 as known persons. More than 73,000 Americans remain unaccounted for from WWII. Military Funeral Honors: Post 27 has provided Military Funeral Honors for six veterans' funerals this month. We work with the National Guard. Post 27 provides an American flag and the service flag of the deceased at the graveside, the rifle volley, assist with the playing of TAPS, present a "shell casing display" to commemorate the Military Honors (see photo), and in the tradition of Arlington Cemetery, we present a condolence card from the Post.



As boys, we played marbles together at school and under the canopy of the blacksmiths shop across from the courthouse. Together we played basketball on dirt courts and rode our bicycles over the wood frame work of the oil pit next to the fire bell, behind the red and white grocery store. The movies together on Thursday nights in the rock chapel and the great times we all had in school just before the Japanese attack on Pearl Harbor. It all changed as our older brothers and friends

left to serve God and Country. I remember the Blue Stars in the front window of almost every home in Farmington. The trauma as purple hearts and Gold Stars were added by their side. The deep and determine spirit to join even when too young.

How proud I was to help place a flag at the headstone of the hundreds who rest in peace having served each of us with heart, mind, might and strength. The new memorial with each name inscribed is worthy of a visit to honor our comrades who gave their best. DID YOU KNOW? Soldiers have for decades mended broken gear with "hundred-mile-anhour" tape. But why is the green utility tape's strength measured in speed? The adhesive strip's name is a result of its versatility, according to Luther Hanson, curator at the Army Quartermaster Museum, who said the origin of the name is rooted in Army lore. The banding material, much like silver duct tape, has been used to repair "almost everything," from tents to windshields and door handles on jeeps, Hanson said. The idea was you use it on something, whether you were transporting it in the vehicle, or use it on the vehicle, and it

would hold at least up to 90 or 100 miles per hour," he said. Other military versions of the tape have been used to repair holes on aircraft. The tape first appeared in ranks during World War II. (<u>The Army Times</u>, March 12, 2012)
