Memorial Day: A Time to Look Back...and Forward

Each year Memorial Day marks the unofficial beginning of summer, conjuring images of picnics, barbeques or just a lazy day off. Traditional observance of Memorial day has diminished over the years. Many Americans nowadays have forgotten the meaning and traditions of Memorial Day. At many cemeteries, the graves of the fallen are increasingly ignored, neglected. Most people no longer remember the proper flag etiquette for the day. While there are towns and cities that still hold Memorial Day parades, many have not held a parade in decades. Some people think the day is for honoring any and all dead, and not just those fallen in service to our country. Of course, this is not so for members of The American Legion, as evidenced by our participation in multiple

Yet even as we look back in reverence in memory of our fallen comrades, perhaps it is also a good time to look forward

Surely, our DD-214s and Discharge Certificates attest to who we are and what we have done but the blue hat each of us wears sends an equally powerful message. There are two days in May that are significant to Veterans and Legionnaires; they are Armed Forces Day, May 17, 2014, and Memorial Day, May 26, 2014. Armed Forces Day is a day to pay tribute to the men and women who serve the United States armed forces in times of war and peace. Those who are honored on this day include people who serve in the Army, Navy, Marine Corps, Air Force and Coast Guard. On this day, in addition to the American flag, proudly display your service flag.

Memorial Day we honor the more than one million men and women who lost their lives defending America in wars from the Revolution to the global war on terrorism. On this day let us remember and ponder on those who fell fighting in the prime of their lives to give us the freedom we enjoy.

A former Marine friend sent me the dramatic photo on the right. Steeped in symbolism, it was taken at the National Cemetery in Minneapolis, MN on a June morning, as it appeared in the Minneapolis Star/Tribune. It was titled "Our symbol standing guard" Talk about a picture being worth a thousand words! It says it all.

American Flag Etiquette— To place the flag at half-staff, hoist the flag to the peak for an instant and lower it to a position half way between the top and bottom of the staff. The flag is to be raised again to the peak for a moment before it is lowered. On Memorial the flag is displayed at half-staff until noon and at full staff from noon until sunset.

I remember the basketball pick-up games at the net-less hoop in our dirt yard. The summer music from the merry-go-round at Lagoon and the laughter and cheer of those daring the rides. The early morning whistle at Miller Floral calling many to the rose and carnation beds. The sleigh rides down the path leading up to the school house. The Thursday night movies at the Rock Chapel.

I also remember the cheerful and happy faces of the boys, men, and women, who in Army, Navy, Marine and Air Force uniforms, sat at the counters of the Rampton Drug store or Smith's café and shared their experiences serving flag and country. Never will I forget the blue stars, purple hearts, and gold stars that were in the front window of almost every home in Farmington. It was a time of selfless sacrifice and dedication to protect the liberty and freedom that all Americans enjoy today.

With a happy heart I will walk through the grass, step around monuments, plant a flag at the grave, salute, and express my love and appreciation for the voice, face, personality, and life of each warrior who served God and Country. They were and are our relatives, friends, neighbors, and hero's. God bless each one of them. And God bless each living warrior of American Legion Farmington Post 27, on this special memorial day of remembering.

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The History of Memorial Day

Memorial Day, originally called Decoration Day, is a day of remembrance for those who have died in our nation's service. There are many stories as to its actual beginnings, with more than two dozen cities and towns laying claim to being the birthplace of Memorial Day. There is also evidence that organized women's groups in the South were decorating graves before the end of the Civil War: a hymn published in 1867, "Kneel Where Our Loves are Sleeping" by Nella L. Sweet carried the dedication "To The Ladies of the South who are Decorating the Graves of the Confederate Dead" (Source: Duke University's Historic American Sheet Music, 1850-1920). While Waterloo N.Y. was officially declared the birthplace of Memorial Day by President Lyndon Johnson in May 1966, it's

difficult to prove conclusively the origins of the day. It is more likely that it had many separate beginnings; each of those towns and every planned or spontaneous gathering of people to honor the war dead in the 1860's tapped into the general human need to honor our dead. It is not important who was the very first, what is important is that Memorial Day was established. Memorial Day is not about division. It is about reconciliation; it is about

Memorial Day was officially proclaimed on 5 May 1868 by General John Logan, national commander of the Grand Army of the Republic, and was first observed on 30 May 1868, when flowers were placed on the graves of Union and Confederate soldiers at Arlington National Cemetery. The first state to recognize the holiday officially was New

coming together to honor those who gave their all.



York in 1873. By 1890 it was recognized by all of the northern states. The South refused to acknowledge the day, honoring their dead on separate days until after World War I (when the holiday changed from honoring just those who died fighting in the Civil War to honoring Americans who died fighting in any war). It is now celebrated in almost every state on the last Monday in May to ensure a three-day weekend for Federal holidays), though several southern states have an additional separate day for honoring the Confederate war dead: January 19 in Texas, April 26 in Alabama, Florida, Georgia, and Mississippi; May 10 in South Carolina; and June 3 (Jefferson Davis' birthday) in Louisiana and Tennessee.

As individuals, we can do small things that show support: visit a fellow veteran in the hospital or care facility; mow a lawn for the family of a deployed military member, volunteer at the Ogden VA Nursing Home or the VA Medical Center/Nursing home in Salt Lake City; donate blood for the military or our Department Adjutant's son, Collin Rowley; visit one of the local university/college Veterans Center and see if there are any opportunities to assist fellow veteran students in any way or just talk with them; or encourage veterans who are having a difficult time readjusting to contact the VA for more definitive help.
