I was sitting in the waiting room at the VA Medical Center in Salt Lake City. The staff of doctors, nurses and volunteers have provided me with excellent care. But my focus that day was drawn to the hundreds of my fellow veterans who walked, limped, shuffled and rolled through the corridors. The vision brought to my mind the awful cost that many of our veterans have paid through their service to their country. When we took the oath of service, none of us considered the effects we would suffer years from then. After all, we were young and invulnerable.

Combat affected many of us early on but the years have taken a toll on all of us made worse by the demands of our military duties. I thought to myself "If only other folks could see what I'm seeing now, they would have a much greater appreciation for the men and women who wore and wear

uniform." In times of the nation's need, we were the ones who ran toward the danger rather than from it. We were the ones who often left our homes and families for meager pay to stand as sentinels against our country's enemies. We do not crave parades or medals. We simply want folks to remember what we did and respect the efforts we made. I know of none of my fellow veterans who feels he or she was a hero - among them many who **ARE** bone fide heroes. We all feel like we were just doing our job. And we did it so our children and our children's children would not have to do it. Perhaps that's just a pipe dream but my fellow veterans and I did make the effort. As you enjoy the bountiful life, thank a veteran.

The American Legion Preamble has been the beacon light of The American Legion for almost 100 years. It has been amended only once in all that time. That amendment consisted of adding the letter "S" to the word "war." It makes the Preamble read today "Great Wars," so as to embrace all wars.

"For God and Country, we associate ourselves together for the following purposes:

To uphold and defend the Constitution of the United States of America; to maintain law and order; to foster and perpetuate a 100-percent Americanism; to preserve the memories and incidents of our associations in the great wars; to inculcate a sense of individual obligation to the community, state and nation; to combat the autocracy of both the classes and the masses; to make right the master of might; to promote

Frank Ferrante combut the dutocracy of both the classes and the masses; to make right the master of might; to promote peace and good will on earth; to safeguard and transmit to posterity the principles of justice, freedom and democracy; to consecrate and sanctify our comradeship by our devotion to mutual helpfulness.

There are 10 clauses of the Preamble, though brief, each clause has a world of meaning. For the following months I would like to review each clause separately.

TO MAKE RIGHT THE MASTER OF MIGHT...

All wars from the Veterans of which The American Legion draws its membership were started by dictators who wanted their might to be the right. If human freedom is not to perish from the earth, right must always be master of might. The rights of small nations must be protected against the tyranny that powerful neighbors may seek to impose on them-just as the rights of minorities in our society must be protected and respected. Our belief in enthroning right over might is the main essence of our ideological conflict with Communism today. Legionnaires are pledged by this clause always to stand with the right, protect the weak and preserve the liberties of the individual. This concept is the basis of The American Legion's continued advocacy of a strong national preparedness so as to achieve the ideal situation that right will be backed by adequate might.



Leadership and the Janitor (Part 2) by James Moschgat, USAF (Ret.)

Last month, we shared the story of **William "Bill" Crawford,** a janitor at the Air Force Academy, who, by the way, just happened to have earned the Medal of Honor for his service in Italy in 1943. This shy, unassuming man taught some great lessons in leadership to the young cadets – and the rest of us as well. This is the second part of the story.

A wise person once said, "It's not life that's important, but those you meet along the way that make the difference." Bill was one who made a difference for me. Bill Crawford, our janitor, taught me many valuable, unforgettable leadership lessons, and I think of him often. Here are ten I'd like to share:

- 1.) **Be Cautious of Labels**. Labels you place on people may define your relationship to them and bind their potential. Sadly, and for a long time, we labeled Bill as just a janitor, but he was so much more. Therefore, be cautious of a leader who callously says, "Hey, he's just an Airman." Likewise, don't tolerate the O-1, who says, "I can't do that, I'm just a lieutenant."
- 2.) **Everyone Deserves Respect**. Because we hung the "janitor" label on Mr. Crawford, we often wrongly treated him with less respect than others. He deserved much more, and not just because he was received the Medal of Honor. Bill deserved respect because he was a janitor, walked among us, and was a part of our team.
- 3.) **Courtesy Makes a Difference**. Be courteous to all around you, regardless of rank or position. Military customs, as well as common courtesies, help bond a team. When our daily words to Mr. Crawford turned from perfunctory "hellos" to heartfelt greetings, his demeanor and personality outwardly changed. It made a difference for all of us.
- 4.) **Take Time to Know Your People**. Life in the military is hectic, but that's no excuse for not knowing the people you work for and with. For years a hero walked among us at the Academy and we never knew it. Who are the heroes that walk in your midst?
- 5.) Anyone Can Be a Hero. Mr. Crawford certainly didn't fit anyone's standard definition of a hero. Moreover, he was just a private on the day he earned his Medal. Don't sell your people short, for any one of them may be the hero who rises to the occasion when duty calls. On the other hand, it's easy to turn to your proven performers when the chips are down, but don't ignore the rest of the team. Today's rookie could and should be tomorrow's superstar.
- 6.) **Leaders Should Be Humble**. Most modern day heroes, and some leaders, are anything but humble, especially if you calibrate your "hero meter" on today's athletic fields. End zone celebrations and self-aggrandizement are what we've come to expect from sports greats. Not Mr. Crawford—he was too busy working to celebrate his past heroics. Leaders would be well served to do the same.
- 7.) **Life Won't Always Hand You What You Think You Deserve**. We in the military work hard and, dang it, we deserve recognition, right? However, sometimes you just have to persevere, even when accolades don't come your way. Perhaps you weren't nominated for junior officer or airman of the quarter as you thought you should -- don't let that stop you.

Don't pursue glory; pursue excellence. Private Bill Crawford didn't pursue glory -- he did his duty and then swept floors for a living.

- 8.) **No Job is Beneath a Leader**. If Bill Crawford, a Medal of Honor recipient, could clean latrines and smile, is there a job beneath your dignity? Think about it.
- 9.) **Pursue Excellence**. No matter what task life hands you, do it well. Dr. Martin Luther King said, "If life makes you a street sweeper, be the best street sweeper you can be." Mr. Crawford modeled that philosophy and helped make our dormitory area a home.
- 10.) Life is a Leadership Laboratory. All too often we look to some school or class to teach us about leadership when, in fact, life is a leadership laboratory. Those you meet every day will teach you enduring lessons if you just take time to stop, look, and listen. I spent four years at the Air Force Academy, took dozens of classes, read hundreds of books, and met thousands of great people. I gleaned leadership skills from all of them, but one of the people I remember most is Mr. Bill Crawford and the lessons he unknowingly taught. Don't miss your opportunity to learn.

Bill Crawford was a janitor. However, he was also a teacher, friend, role model, and one great American hero.

POW/MIA News

Lost Since WWII, Remains Repatriated



The Defense POW/MIA Accounting Agency (DPAA), in conjunction with the Department of Defense, U.S. Embassy New Delhi and the Government of India, held a repatriation ceremony Apr. 13 in **New Delhi, India** to pay full honors to what they believe are the possible remains of crew members of a B-24 and C-119 aircraft that were lost in India in January 1944 and July 1945 respectively.

Attended by Defense Secretary Ash Carter, this event marks the first time the U.S. has repatriated remains from the country of India.

Remains from the B-24 bomber were recovered by a DPAA expeditionary team last fall from steep terrain at the 9000 ft. level in the Indian Himalayas. Eight personnel assigned to the 14th Air Force, 308th Bomb Group were aboard the aircraft at the time of its loss, with all unaccounted for.

Family members of the B-24 aircrew were in Hawaii when the remains arrived. The remains will undergo DNA testing as well as dental and biological analysis at the DPAA lab there.

The remains turned over from a third-party organization are believed to belong to members of a four-man Army Air Force crew that was aboard a C-119 that crashed as it travelled from Jorhat, India to Hsinching, China.
