I just finished reading "Return with Honor", a book about US Air Force Captain Scott O'Grady, who on June 2, 1995 was helping enforce the NATO no-fly zone in the skies over Bosnia when a Soviet-made antiaircraft missile slammed into his F-16. He managed to eject as his jet was exploding around him, safely parachute down into enemy territory, struggled for six days to survive in a war-torn hostile land, and relying on his survival training, cunning, and deep faith in God, managed to evade capture and established contact with the comrades-in-arms who could pull him out. It is an easy reading book which has a ton of good adventure and details about his experiences. I thought it was quite an inspirational tale of courage, faith, and patriotism. There were three things he learned from this event that became priorities as stated in his book. Number one was faith in God, the source of all goodness. Number two was the love of family and friends. That love wasn't something apart from faith, nor was a by-product. It was faith's fullest expression. We spread God's love through our caring toward others.

And number three was good health, the physical foundation for faith and love. I would highly



Veterans Day 2018 will mark 100 years since the end of World War I. More than 7,000 Americans were POW/MIA from that conflict. The chart below is one estimate of the number of Americans who are listed POW/MIA from all conflicts. I take it with a grain of salt but the Civil War numbers are sobering.

Nov. 10-12, 1919

First Legion convention convenes in Minneapolis. The Constitution and preamble are adopted. Delegates vote 361-323 to locate the Legion's national headquarters in Indianapolis, instead of Washington. A resolution is passed in support of Boy Scouts of America. Today, the Legion is the chartering agency for more than 2,500 Scouting units made up of approximately 64,000 youths.

Our **November goal** is to focus on **Point 4** of the Five Star Award is **Leadership.** Lolly Daskal, President and CEO and writer of "Lead From Within," says that "effective leadership can be thought of as a set of qualities and skills. Different leaders may have different makeups, different strengths and challenges. But there are certain traits that lie at the core of leadership-the qualities that all great leaders have."

From my prospective, leadership skills can be learned. If that were not the case, why then do we have leadership courses, military academies, leadership symposiums, and the like? I believe that anyone can become a good leader, but it takes challenging work, participation and a desire to take charge.

Leadership Principle 4 is a part of the Sons of the American Legion training because we believe that the future leaders of The American Legion will come from our younger veterans and SAL members. That is why I place *Participation* as a key principle in becoming a leader. If you don't participate as an active member, you will never know enough about the organization and its programs to lead others. Knowledge, confidence, honesty, and trustworthiness are also keys to a good leader.

I always like to quote our SAL Preamble when I talk about participation. "Proud possessors of a priceless heritage, we male descendants of veterans of the Great Wars, associate ourselves together as 'Sons of the American Legion'......". Think about what "priceless heritage", "veterans of the Great Wars", and "associate ourselves together" mean. Does that sound like a card carrying member that does not participate, or an active member that values the fact that he can serve as an active member, and one that values past veterans who gave their all for their county. Our monthly training programs are designed to help each member learn how to become a leader. Those who attend are destined to become organizational leaders in the future. Those who fail to participate will not. We need you and you need us. Place the first Thursday of each month at 6:30 pm on your calendar and reminder list. Plan on attending. 1. What are the principle requirements of true leadership?

Suggested answer - Leadership requires that the leader has a workable plan which he communicates to others in the group to get their cooperation in putting the plan into action. It requires working with people in a way that gets them to assume responsibility and to work toward the goals outlined in the plan. Some of the prime requirements of leadership are:

- 1) Determining what to do;
- 2) Thinking about ways to do it;
- 3) Making firm decisions;

- 4) Assigning work and authority;
- 5) Persuading and directing others; and
- 6) Checking on progress.

2. Who was commander-in-chief of the Armed Forces in the United States during World War I and World War II?

Answer - World War I, Woodrow Wilson; World War II, Franklin D. Roosevelt and Harry S. Truman.

- A. Name five Americans noted in leadership in the Army, Navy, Air Force and Marine Corps.
- B. Name five Americans noted for leadership in industry.
- C. Name five outstanding statesman in American history.

Answers - A, B and C can be answered by using the library or online research.

3. Does a good leader do all the work himself or see that it is done by others?

Answer - A good leader assigns work so that others will work with him when given the proper authority.

4. Name the present national, state and local leaders of The American Legion.

Answer – National Commander: Brett P. Reistad, Department of Utah Commander: Hayes Stromness, District II Commander: Joe Guimond, Post 27 Commander: Kent Hansen.

- 5. How would you develop qualities of leadership? Explain these qualities.
- 6. Demonstration of leadership by holding office in the squadron, or by leadership in group activities of the squadron.
- 7. Demonstration of leadership in school.
- 8. Demonstration of leadership in a church.
- 9. Demonstration of leadership in sports and contests outside of squadron activities.
- 10. Write a short essay on leadership. (To be graded by the post committee)

Answer - Those judging these essays should determine whether objectives have been set, some attention has been given to personal attitudes, proper thinking has been stressed, and if the essay allows for delegation of authority, motivation and follow-up.
