

October 8th will be marked with observance of Columbus Day, a federal holiday and a day to fly your flag. Although it is not a veterans' related holiday, Columbus's discovery of the Americas set the ball rolling for the eventual establishment of the United States of America with the freedoms and rights as citizens we now all enjoy and have had bequeathed to us by the



ensuing generations. These rights and freedoms have been preserved through the efforts of faithful veterans like you and others who have given selflessly for our nation, and by those currently serving in our military. Among the many citizens rights we hold are the right to vote for the political candidates of our own choosing. In addition to the election of officials, this year's ballot also includes **3** Constitutional Amendments: A, B and C; one nonbinding opinion question and Propositions Number 2, Number 3 and Number 4. Seven of these eight items will have a legal binding effect on Utahans. To aide us in our responsibility to be an informed

Important Election Dates

- General Election: November 6, 2018 •
- Mail ballots are mailed to voters: between October 8, 2018 and October 16, 2018
- In-person early voting: October 23, 2018 through November 2, 2018
- Mail ballot postmark deadline: on or before November 5, 2018 (the day before the Election)

You can register to vote at the polls on Election Day or during the Early Voting Period, but if you register beforehand:

- October 9, 2018: is the last day to register to vote by mailing in a registration form.
- October 30, 2018: is the last day to register to vote online or at your county clerk's office. •

What is a Veteran? A Veteran, whether active duty, discharged, retired or reserve, is someone who, at one point in his or her life, wrote a blank check made payable to "The United States of America" for an amount of "up to and including their life." That is honor, and

there are too many people in this country today, who no longer understand that fact.

Veterans are entitled to Military Funeral Honors consisting of a rifle volley, the playing of Taps and the folding of the American flag that is presented to next of kin. The participation and service you have rendered this year in community activities has been exemplary and has brought high praise from the communities and families we serve. Without you, Post 27 cannot operate and provide this service.

As members of the American Legion, we volunteer as needed to meet the demands that we are asked to perform. Among those who gave all in defense of freedom was Captain John "Buzz" Ellison. Ellison lived in Layton, UT, graduated from the US Naval Academy in 1952 and was a member of Attack Squadron 85, Carrier Air Wing 11 aboard the aircraft carrier USS Kitty Hawk (CVA-63).

On March 24, 1967, he was the pilot of a Grumman Attack Aircraft Intruder (A-6A) to suppress surface to air missile sites around the Bac Giang Thermal Power Plant

in North Vietnam. After completing the mission the aircraft continued north about 11 miles where contact was lost.

On September 5, 1975 the Secretary of the Navy approved a Presumptive Finding of Death. His remains were never recovered. His name is inscribed on the Courts of the Missing at the National Memorial Cemetery of the Pacific, Honolulu, Hawaii. He is honored on panel 17E, Row 35 of the Vietnam Veterans Memorial in Washington DC.

The long-standing objective of the Legion to improve adjudication procedures for veterans claims is achieved when the U.S. Court of Veterans Appeals becomes operational. Most of the provisions contained in the law creating the court were originally included in the Veterans Reassurance Act, written by the Legion and introduced in Congress in 1988.

Our October 2018 goal is to complete **Point 3**, **Discipline** on the **Five Star Award**. Discipline is a critical factor in life and in any organization. Self-control is a personal form of discipline. To become an Eagle Scout, a young man must establish short and long-term goals. It starts at 8 years old and concludes in some cases as late as a scout's 18th birthday. Setting goals is a lot like attempting to eat an elephant. It is impossible to consume such a large animal in one sitting. Like in Scouting, you can't be an Eagle Scout overnight. Just the rank advancement coupled with obtaining 21 merit badges, campouts, attendance and participation, and other requirements it takes as a minimum from 11-13 years of age. Most scouts get their Eagle Scout Award in the 14-15 age range.

I would like to challenge each of the adults and youth of our Sons of the American Legion Squadron to set a goal to receive their **Ten Ideas Award**, and each **individual Star Award** that leads to the **Five Star Award**. The training program we have established helps each boy who participates in our monthly meeting and activities the opportunity to complete parts of these awards.

To date, we have 10 members that have completed 4-8 of the Ten Ideals on route to completion by December of this year. We also have 8 members that have completed 3-4 of the Five Star requirements. In most cases all they must do is have a conference with our advancement committee. We are looking at January to present these awards. Participation is the key to success. Set a goal and you can achieve almost anything.

Discipline

What is discipline and how might it be developed?

Answer - Discipline is training to live within the rules determined by parents, schools, government and churches. It is developed by constant practice in living up to the goals that have been set.

- **2.** Why is discipline essential in the handling of all group activities? Answer - Group activities are effective only when you have rules. This includes following the rules, establishing discipline and developing the ability to take direction from whoever is the leader.
- **3.** Briefly outline **why discipline is essential** to **law and order**. Answer - The basic need for law and order is to enable people to live within a group and with each other. The rights and opinions of each person must be respected at the same time you are respecting fundamental rights of the group. Discipline is the cornerstone from which law and order develops.
- 4. Demonstrate **good conduct** in squadron meetings.
- 5. Demonstrate **good grades** in school.
- 6. Participate on drill teams, rifle teams, athletic teams, bands, drum corps, etc.
- 7. Show respect for older people (Refer to Point 8 of the Ten Ideals).
- Practice self-control in every respect, Answer - Demonstrate ability to start projects or establish goals and to work with others.

- 10. Support and help your squadron, post and Auxiliary in achieving good relations
