#### THE AMERICAN LEGION PREAMBLE

The American Legion Preamble has been the beacon light of The American Legion for almost 100 years. It has been amended only once in all that time. That amendment consisted of adding the letter "S" to the word "war." It makes the Preamble read today "Great Wars," so as to embrace all wars. "For God and Country, we associate ourselves together for the following purposes:

**To uphold and defend** the Constitution of the United States of America; to maintain law and order; to foster and perpetuate a 100-percent Americanism; to preserve the memories and incidents of our associations in the great wars; to inculcate a sense of individual obligation to the community, state and nation; to combat the autocracy of both the classes and the masses; to make right the master of might;

to promote peace and good will on earth; to safeguard and transmit to posterity the principles of justice, freedom and democracy; to consecrate and sanctify our comradeship by our devotion to mutual helpfulness

There are 10 clauses of the Preamble, though brief, each clause has a world of meaning. For the next few months I would like to review each clause separately.



#### 3. TO FOSTER AND PERPETUATE A 100 PERCENT AMERICANISM...

Americanism is the gist of the American ideals of freedom, justice, individual rights and unfenced-in opportunities. It embraces all the freedoms we cherish and all the rights that are guaranteed to us. It is the very opposite of hatred, bigotry and intolerance. Americanism is the creed that has blazed the world-wide trail for justice, fair play, and decency, belief in God, private enterprise, universal education, and progress in all human endeavors. It puts a premium on the virtues of loyalty, patriotism, hard work and thrift.

Fifty one Legionnaires have paid their dues so far. Fifty five Legionnaires still have not paid. The membership price will be increased by \$5 per year by January 20, 2016, so I would love to get the rest of the membership cards out to you as soon as possible. The increase is needed to fulfill the Legion's mission to assist veterans, troops, youth and those coming home from war. Nearly a decade has passed since the American Legion's last national per-capita dues increase. During that span, the U.S. cost of living has climbed 13 percent. The National Executive Committee passed a resolution at the 2015 Spring Meeting in Indianapolis to recommend a \$5 per-capita annual increase in national membership dues. From July 1, 2015 to the end of the year you can renew and have the early bird stamp on your 2016 membership card. It is also time to start talking to those around you that have served during a war period to join the American Legion. I believe with all your help, we can exceed the 107% that we had this last year. As always, you may renew by sending your \$30 annual membership dues to our Post: P.O. Box 427, Farmington, UT 84025-0427.
