## Commander's Corner

I PLEDGE...

I was sitting in the Main Hall in the Reno-Sparks Convention Center as National Commander Charlie Schmidt went through the series of opening ceremonies including the Pledge of Allegiance. Now, I have recited the Pledge thousands of times dating back to my earliest school days, as I expect you have too. But this time, as I stood among thousands of Legionnaires, the Pledge spoke to me as it never had before. The first two words burned into me: "I pledge..." It means that I give my solemn oath that I will do all in

my power to uphold and defend the flag of the United States. It occurs to me that I made this pledge as a child; I made it again when I was sworn into the U.S. Navy; and I am still making it as a veteran. I suspect most of you have, too.

I haven't been a member of the Legion for anywhere near as long as many of you but I joined because I hoped that this organization had some substance beyond the patriotic words. In Post 27, I have found folks who go far beyond the words. They understand

what it means to "pledge."

When I came to the Post in 2011, I was greeted and welcomed by a firebrand of a Post Commander in the person of Paula Stephenson. She led me, taught me, mentored me and befriended me. Perhaps, most importantly, she taught me the meaning of "I pledge." With a military career that spanned 30 years, she has never stopped serving. Her pledge is not the passive spectator patriotism of the "Support Our Troops" bumper stickers. Paula is a hands-on patriot who seems to be tireless in finding opportunities to assist veterans and promote our country.

## 1st Vice Commander



We all remember the attack that happened to our country on September 11, 2001. I recently came across the following article about one of the many incidents that happened on that day, and would like to share it with you.

A chaplain, assigned to the Pentagon, told of an incident that occurred right after Flight 77 hit the Pentagon on 9/11. A daycare facility inside the Pentagon had many children, including infants who were in heavy cribs. The daycare supervisor, looking at all the children they needed to evacuate, was in a panic over what they could do. There were many children, mostly toddlers, as well as the infants that would need to be taken out with the cribs. There was no time to try to bundle them into carriers and strollers.

Just then a young Marine came running into the center and asked what they needed. After hearing

what the center director was trying to do, he ran back out into the hallway and disappeared. The director thought, "Well, here we are, on our own." About two minutes later, that Marine returned with 40 other Marines in tow. Each of them grabbed a crib with a child, and the rest started gathering up toddlers. The director and her staff then helped them take all the children out of the center and down toward the park near the Potomac and the Pentagon.

Once they got about three quarters of a mile outside the building, the Marines stopped in the park, and then did a fabulous thing - they formed a circle with the cribs, which were quite sturdy and heavy, like the covered



wagons in the Old West. Inside this circle of cribs, they put the toddlers, to keep them from wandering off. Outside this circle were the 40 Marines, forming a perimeter around the children and waiting for instructions. There they remained until the parents could be notified to come and get their children. The chaplain then said, "I don't think any of us saw nor heard of this on any of the news stories of the day." It was an incredible story of our men there. There wasn't a dry eye in the room. The thought of those Marines and what they did and how fast they reacted; could we expect any less from them? It was one of the most touching stories from the Pentagon.

It's the <u>Military</u>, not the politicians, that ensure our right to life, liberty, and the pursuit of happiness. It's the <u>Military</u> that salutes the flag, that serves beneath the flag, and whose coffin is draped by the flag. If you care to offer the smallest token of recognition and appreciation for the military, please pass this on and pray for our men and women, who have served and are currently serving our country, and pray for those who have given the ultimate sacrifice for freedom.

Reminder, the American Legion is only as strong as its membership base. The more devoted members it has, the better the organization can advocate for veterans and serve the military community which given much to our country. Invite a potential member to our meetings.

**Flag Etiquette** – The flag should be raised briskly and lowered slowly and ceremoniously. Ordinary it should be displayed between sunrise and sunset. It should be illuminated if displayed at night.



One of the most gratifying programs we run is the Eagle Courts of Honor. We honor our flag by doing a tribute to our flag through a ceremony of folding the Stars and Stripes for those scouts that have achieved the rank of Eagle. The flag is folded with the star upper-most, which reminds us of our national motto, 'In GOD We Trust". It is the duty and obligation of every American to uphold, defend, and preserve these Stars

and Stripes, Old Glory, our flag. This is what we are trying to instill in the Eagle Scouts through this ceremony.

Scouting is important and the American Legion in some states sponsor local troops. Taking a glance at the representation of scouting in Congress shows how important it is in this county. Of the 535 members of the 115<sup>th</sup> U.S. Congress, 150 have some sort of connection to the BSA. That's 28 percent. We define connection as one or more of the following: They were in Scouting as a youth (Cub Scout, Boy Scout, Venturer, Sea Scout, Explorer), They earned the Eagle Scout rank, They served (or are still serving) as a BSA adult volunteer. ## POW/MIA News



#### **TWO FORGOTTEN DAYS**

In 1979, Congress passed a resolution authorizing National POW/MIA Recognition Day. Since 1986 this observance had been on the third Friday in September. Observances of National POW/MIA Recognition Day are held across the country on military installations, ships at sea, state capitols and veterans' facilities. This year, local former POWs and families have been invited to the Utah State Capitol. This is one of the six days that Congress has mandated flying of the National League of Families' POW/MIA flag. The others are Armed Forces Day, Memorial Day, Flag Day, Independence Day and Veterans Day. Today, more that 1,600 Americans remain unaccounted for from the Vietnam conflict. During August, four MIA's were accounted for; one from WW II, one from Korea and two from Vietnam.

## Jake Garn Sea Cadet Squadron



Prior to drill, this month, some cadets were able to support the Davis County Fair, Flag Retirement Ceremony. It was a great event, as it always is and the cadets were proud to be part of it.

August drill was an overnight drill up in Pineview. Saturday August 19. 2017 the cadets were given a presentation on underwater recovery by the Department of Public Safety, Dive Team. The cadets were involved in scenarios that mimicked identifying and recovering weapons of mass destruction, identifying and

recovering a drowning victim, and understanding the importance of the gear they use and the redundancy involved. We wrapped up with recovering a body from the water emphasizing the dignity and respect involved. Each time we work with the Dive Team, they surpass our expectations

in the training that they provide. Later in the day Cadets were given a class on tactical maneuvers that involved approaching an enemy and clearing a room and building. The Cadets found the training exciting and had a chance to wear a vest that was fully loaded with plates and handle training weapons to give them the feel of actually conducting a maneuver. After evening chow the Jake Garn Squadron conducted a flag retirement ceremony which was done with solemnity and reverence. To close the day the squadron was broken down into two teams and Alpha team and a Bravo team. The objective was to capture the Jake Garn Squadron Flag but there were some twists.

Sunday August 20, 2017 brought further instructions on how to clear a room and practice maneuvers with the gear from Saturday's training. After the training was drown-proofing, An assessment was conducted on each cadet to see their level of swimming ability and to see if they have basic skills in the water. Most of the cadets are ready to move to the next level of drown-proofing training which will be conducted during a different drill. After the assessment, the cadets were able to unwind in the water and have fun. August drill brought new experiences for many cadets. During instructions and capture the flag brought opportunities for cadets to practice leadership skills by moving their team members during maneuver practice and or leading their team to victory.



## **ABOVE AND BEYOND**

We never know just what challenges await us. It was true when we wore the uniform and it is just as true under the blue Legion cap. Very recently, the Post 27 Honor Guard was called upon to provide military funeral honors for a fallen veteran. As we have already done this nearly 50 times this year, we were pleased once again to accept the assignment. However, this interment was unique in that the deceased veteran had seven sons, each of whom wanted the flag from the coffin. The National Guard MFH unit was authorized to fold and present only one flag. So in the spirit of "adapt and



overcome," the Post 27 Honor Guard arranged for six more flags to be draped on the coffin. After the first presentation, the rifle volley and the playing of Taps, the rifle squad marched smartly to graveside. In pairs, the Legionnaires lifted each flag, folded them ceremoniously and presented them to each of the brothers. The Post 27 Honor Guard on that day included: Ron Craig (commanding), Frank Ferrante, Dave Parker, Dave Layton, Dave Standing, Paul Hubenthal, Dale Crockett and Kent Hansen.
