PATRIOT DAY...EVERY DAY

At 8:46 am on September 11, 2001, American Airlines Flight 11 slammed into floors 93 through 99 of the North Tower of the World Trade Center. Only 17 minutes later, United Flight 175 ripped into floors 75 to 85 of the South Tower. Thirty four minutes more passed before American Flight 77 crashed into the Pentagon.



Every decent person on the planet shuddered at the heinous and cowardly **Kent Hansen** attack that targeted innocent civilians. These intolerant terrorists declared war on America because we do not worship in the same way they do; they hate us because our system of democracy works and the government of tyranny they espouse does not.

The intent of the 9/11 attacks sought to bring our country to its knees. Instead, though staggered, Americans rose as one to face the foe. First responders dashed into the stricken towers, intent on saving lives, only to have those very towers collapse on them. We Americans responded as we did after Pearl Harbor: with a united front to confront an enemy determined to destroy freedom and democracy.



These attacks brought to the surface a spirit that has propelled American GIs from our country's birth to today and into the future. For many of us, that spirit has never died and,

through The American Legion, we continue to serve the country we love. As we bring our first 100 years to a close, we can feel justifiable pride in the GI Bill of Rights, the U.S. Flag Code, the Veterans Administration, Boys State, Legion Baseball, disability benefits for victims of Agent Orange and a host of other services for veterans, all of which originated with The American Legion. So as we observe Patriot Day this September 11, let us remember that patriotism is not just something to be celebrated once a year, but rather a creed by which to live every day of every year. If you served in-country between 1962 – 1975, there is presumed exposure to Agent Orange along with a medical diagnosis, and you may be eligible for benefits through the VA. You should make an appointment to file a claim with the VA Outreach representative that comes to our Post two times a month (385-272-8852).

POW/MIA News

45th Anniversary of Freedom

Last month (Aug 16-19) about 140 former POW's assembled at Frisco, Texas (25 minute drive NE of Dallas-Ft Worth airport) to celebrate their 45th Anniversary of Freedom from the Prisons of Vietnam. It was heartwarming for me to hug former cellmates but sobering to accept the fact that we knew each other as young men and that now we are old.

Unexpectedly, appreciative Vietnamese-Americans provided an elaborate lunch for us. They referred to themselves as "U.S. Armed Forces Association of Vietnamese-Americans." There were many expressions of gratitude for our support in their civil war. There were also horror stories resulting from the U.S. withdrawal. I was flattered by their wanting to have their picture taken with me. I was surprised at their energy and education. At least one I met was a lawyer and several are running for political offices.

Our group visited the Bush Presidential Library and Museum, the amazing Cavanaugh Flight Museum, the Dallas Cowboys World Headquarters, Ross Perot's Legacy Hall and his Circle T Ranch complete with wonderful food, music, airshow including B-52s and insightful observations from a former Chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff.

Dr. Roger E. Shields was the speaker for the Farewell Banquet Dinner at the Omni Frisco Hotel. He was in charge of and oversaw the planning and execution of Operation Homecoming in 1973. He was Deputy Assistant Secretary of Defense for P.O.W.-M.I.A. Affairs from 1971 to 1976. He was the Pentagon Official leading the Task Group in charge of accounting for those who did not return. He lives in Georgia, grew up in Florida, married a girl

There were 662 of us that were held captive in Vietnam that got out alive. Seventy three military POW's died in captivity. Officially, 28 of the 73 died in North Vietnam where the Hanoi Hilton and other prisons were located. The conditions in jungles camps of South Vietnam, Laos and Cambodia were crueler.

We remembered those who didn't come home with us.

Citizenship

1. Recite or write the Preamble to the Constitution of the United States of America. Write an essay on what it means to you. (Optional essay)

Answer - We, the people of the United States, in order to form a more perfect union, establish justice, insure domestic tranquility, provide for the common defense, promote the general welfare, and secure the blessings of liberty to ourselves and our posterity, do ordain and establish this Constitution for the United States of America.

2. What date is set aside to commemorate the signing of the Constitution of the United States? Name the five members of the committee chosen to write the Declaration of Independence.

Answer - September 17. Thomas Jefferson, John Adams, Benjamin Franklin, Roger Sherman, Robert R. Livingston.
3. Recite or write the American's Creed. (Optional) Write an essay on what it means to you.

Answer - I believe in the United States of America as a government of the people, by the people, for the people, whose just powers are derived from the consent of the governed; a democracy in a republic; a sovereign nation of many sovereign states; a perfect union, one and inseparable, established upon those principles of freedom, equality, justice and humanity for which American patriots sacrificed their lives and fortunes. I therefore believe it is my duty to my country to love it, to support its Constitution, to obey its laws, to respect its flag and to defend it against all enemies.

4. Name the mayor and members of your city council; the state governor; the congressional representative from your district; and the two U.S. senators from the state. Attend and report on a meeting of the city's governing body.

Pohlman; City Council: Diane Anderson, Gary Anderson, Julia Busche, Jeanne Groberg, Brandon Halliday. Utah: Governor Gary Herbert. House of Representatives: Either Rob Bishop or Chris Stewart, depending on where you live. Senate: Orin Hatch and Mike Lee.

5. What are the three divisions of government provided for in the Constitution of the United States?

Answer - Executive (enforces the laws), Legislative (makes the laws), and Judicial (interprets the laws).

6. Assist the sponsoring post and other agencies in a non-partisan "Get Out the Vote" campaign.

Examples: newspaper ads, fliers and such, urging the public to vote for the candidate of their choice.

7. Assist nonprofit campaigns such as United Way, Red Cross, etc.

8. Participate in oratorical and essay contests on citizenship subjects. These contests are sponsored by both The American Legion and Auxiliary. Students may enter either one for credit.

9. Participate in religious activities. Give a brief written report.

10. Encourage your associates of the benefits of being thrifty.
